WHILE MANY celebrity sports fans enjoyed the opening kickoff of February's Super Bowl from plush nightclub banquettes or high-priced suites at New Jersey's MetLife Stadium, Anthony Mackie was racewalking to NoBar BKNY, the watering hole he owns down the street from his house in the Brooklyn neighborhood of Crown Heights. Unfortunately, the 35-year-old actor arrived too late to catch the world premiere of the trailer for his new film, *Captain America: Winter Soldier*. "Honestly, I was the only person in the world that didn't see it," he says. "I figured it would be a little bit into the game, not the first commercial!"

Mackie doesn't just own NoBar; he can often be found behind the counter slinging drinks. And, further cementing his everyman persona, he freely admits to balking at doing some of his own stunts in *The Winter Soldier*: "They built this 200-foot platform, and they put my stunt man on a harness and dropped him full speed within three feet of the ground, face first. They were like, 'Do you want to do it? We could use your face.' I was like, 'If you want fear and tears, I'll do it.'"

On the surface, the role of The Falcon, Captain America's wingman (literally), might seem a departure from the darker, more emotionally complex fare by which Mackie has made his name: gunned-down hip-hop legend Tupac Shakur in *Notorious*; a bomb-disabling soldier in *The Hurt Locker*; a steroid-addled kidnapper in *Pain & Gain*. Yet much of what attracted Mackie to the part was The Falcon's substance. "The great thing about him is that Marvel took so much time and energy to make him a three-dimensional character. They really spent a lot of time figuring out exactly who he was."

Granted, it will be nice for Mackie to finally appear in a movie his young son will be allowed to watch. Yet even here the actor is assuredly down-to-earth. "When this movie comes out, [my son] will be there, but I keep him 100 percent away from all the work stuff. He's a normal little kid, doing normal stuff. My dad was a roofer. If you grow up in a world of make believe with no boundaries and limits, then you become a make-believe adult." —ERIN BRADY
